> Definition of Modal Verbs:

Are used with another verb to express several intended meanings as permission, ability, possibility...and so on

- Modal Verbs are: can, could, may, might, shall, should, will, would, must, must not, have to, don't have to, be able to, ought to, had better.
- These verbs: do not change in form (they do not have ing, ed, s), and form questions and negatives without the auxiliary (to do)
 - Must Strong obligation
 - Must not Prohibition

 - Can, be able to Ability

Expressing ability:

- 1) Can you ride a bike?
- 2) He has been able to swim for a year
- 3) I <u>can</u> run four kilometres without stopping when I was yonger.

Expressing Obligation:

- 1) I must go to the Bank today
- 2) We <u>have to</u> write the essay before Friday
- 3) She had to wait for him

Expressing prohibition:

- 1) You <u>may not</u> take the photographs to the Museum
- 2) Cars <u>must not</u> park in front of enterance.

Expressing Possibility:

- 1) You <u>may</u> be right
- 2) William <u>may</u> be upstairs
- 3) She **could** be famous one day

Expressing Recommendation and Advice:

- 1) You ought to come with us. It was great
- 2) You **should** say that to him.
- 3) He really **shouldn't** work so hard since he looks exhausted.

Expressing Suggestions and invitations:

- 1) Would you like to come with us?
- 2) **Shall** I carry that for you?
- 3) **Shall** we go out for a meal today?

Expressing permission:

- 1) Can I go now, please?
- 2) May I use your phone, please?
- 3) <u>Can</u> I take this book?

> Expressing Request:

- 1) <u>Could</u> you open the door, please?
- 2) Will you sit down, please?
- 3) Would you come this day?
